Harvest Wind Dedication ~ Our Second Wind Project is Up and Generating

Harvest Wind was officially dedicated in May. It is located adjacent to our White Creek wind farm in Klickitat County on the Columbia Gorge.

Harvest Wind, our second wind farm, was officially dedicated May 12 at a ceremony in Klickitat County on the Columbia Gorge. The ceremony was attended by more than 200 people, including elected officials and representatives from LLP and our three partners in the project – Peninsula Light Company (PenLight) of Gig Harbor, Eugene (OR) Water and Electric Board (EWEB) and Cowlitz County PUD.

LLP General Manager Robin Rego served as master of ceremonies and keynote speaker. In his remarks, Mr. Rego noted that the project was completed in near-record time.

“Harvest Wind was less than two years in the planning and just eight months for construction,” he said. Construction began in Spring 2009 and the project went online in mid-December.

“It was a challenging project,” he said. “There were both advantages and disadvantages.”

The tight construction schedule was driven by

the year-end expiration of the Federal Production Tax Credits.

“And Wall Street was going south, which affected our ability to attract Tax Equity Partners,” Mr. Rego added.

“But we also had significant advantages: we had two of the original partners from White Creek – LLP and Cowlitz PUD. Also, because Harvest Wind is adjacent to White Creek, we were able to use the same project management and construction teams and the same Siemens 2.3 MW turbines we had used on our first project. It was teamwork and cooperation between all the participants that made this project happen.”

Mr. Rego quoted a line from ‘The Wayward Wind,’ a popular song of the 1950s. “It’s a restless wind that yearns to wander,” he said. “The wind is free, but it’s unreliable and completely unpredictable. That can add significant expense in the form of integration charges which must be added to the price to compensate for wind fluctuation. The wind is a renewable resource, to be sure, but it’s not

the elixir or panacea that many still consider it to be.”

The 43 wind turbines at Harvest Wind will generate enough clean, renewable energy to meet the needs of approximately 14,000 households.

Because of LLP’s relatively small size, we are not required to comply with the Renewable Portfolio Standard set by Initiative 937. This allows us to sell power from White Creek and Harvest Wind to utilities that are required to comply.

All entries become the property of Lakeview Light and Power and will be displayed at our 89th Annual Meeting, March 15, 2011.

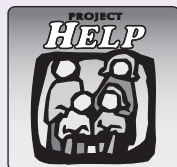

source of much of the water in our system.

"Here in Western Washington and Oregon, most people think of the rain and snow we get in the Cascades and Olympics. But at BPA, we base our water forecasts, to a large extent, on the amount of snowpack in the mountains at the source of the Columbia and Snake Rivers in Idaho and Canada."

In May, projections were that 2010 would be the third driest year in 50 years. That changed the first week in June when the Snake River system received 400% of its average rainfall for the month.

"Many reservoirs are full, and things are looking alot better," Milstein said. "Now it might be the sixth driest year. But that's a big improvement."

Even if the reservoirs are still full later this summer, BPA plans to 'spill' water over the dams in August, as part of its on-going effort to protect salmon and other endangered species.

"Summer spill is pretty much an annual thing now," Milstein said. "It really does help the juvenile fish get downstream. Overall, though, it looks like there will be plenty of power."
